Food is available on the Fork & Dig It plot and is all grown onsite and prepared and cooked by Kamran and members of the Yellow Door collective, and a bar on the Earthship site is run by The Rose Hill and Yellow Door. Drinking water is available at the Earthship plot and on the Fork & Dig It plot.

There are plots and areas on site that are off limits to the public and we ask that you respect all No Entry signs. Alcohol consumption is only permitted at the Earthship site - please respect this and dont take alcohol onto any of the other plots.

The site is still very dry so please be careful not to discard lit cigarettes anywhere on site. We'd like to leave the site as we found it - please use the bins that are dotted around the site.

Compost toilets are situated at the Earthship site and on the Wyld Service plot.

Accessibility: the toilet on Wyld Service is the best for wheelchair users, and plastic tracks are available on the Centre for Ecotherapy plot to help with mobility. There is also a fully accessible toilet in Stanmer Village opposite the tea rooms, which is open from 8am-8pm.

Performers

Baby Hair: minimalist trance pop and ritualistic performance art duo.
RDyer: looped vocals, musical saw, and emergency nose flute.
Jo Burke: solo vocal adventures.
Fettucini Spicer: strategic encounters in faceto-face improvisation both serious and silly.
Alien Alarms: found sounds and words, field recordings, synths and samples.
Myra Stuart & William Blake: avant puppetry.

Safehouse / Yellow Door: improvised music. Iain Paxon: bicycle sounds.

Paul Khimasia Morgan: feedback-like tones rising carefully amid a cloud of metal thorns. **Thee Bald Knobbers**: a berobed beating of the bounds.

Gagarin: A sonic evocation of Surrey woodlands and landscapes.

Al Strachan: cornet, hydrophone and sounds found in Stanmer.

Loner Club: voice, an assortment of percussion with found objects & floor drum. Mediocretron: roving spontaneous soundscapes for invisible films. Danny Bright: sonic ghosts, fractured landscapes and improvised electronics.

Installations and Interactions

Jason Hotchkiss Sonic Shrubbery

Common (or garden) biosonification! An ensemble of simple oscillators hang among the plants and use tiny changes in their electrical conductivity to create a symphony of bleepiness.

Sprouting MIDI

Based on MIDI Sprout from Electricity For Progress. Minute electrical signals from plants are monitored and used to create a sequence of notes. Played out using sampled instrument sounds, an endless orchestral score is produced. **Photo Synthesis**

A set of solar powered sound ocillators, hung together like a child's mobile, is suspended from the trees. Movement and shadow vary the amount of light falling on the solar panels, altering the sequences of chirps and beeps.

Fiery Biscuits Listen to the Bees

A rare chance to eavesdrop on the conversations of bees as they go about their daily business.

I Talk to the Trees

Listen as electronic birds argue in undisclosed locations across the site.

Wave Dome

A white noise and short waves immersion for Willow Dome. Experience and tune out.

Joshua Le Gallienne Listening to the Wind

An activity exploring the sonic qualities of the wind. Led by artist Joshua Le Gallienne, Listening to the Wind adopts a phenomenological approach that aims to encourage new ways of engaging with environmental phenomena. Participants focus on the physical sensations of the wind on the face, embracing the resonances that can be created and perceived when the relationships between the wind and the ears are explored. Find instructions on the postcards you will see at the Breathing Space willow dome.

Chris Sciacca Ear Trumpets Soundwalk

Take a casual auditory stroll using hand crafted analogue listening devices called "ear trumpets" to amplify sounds of nature throughout the park. This is an all ages collective event to encourage creativity, sharing, and selective listening to macro and micro sounds, and hone in on the sonic character of natural materials as we explore. Kersten Glandien Orchard Listening

Listening to sounds through headphones while sitting in natural surroundings can be a very special experience; the sound in your ears blends with the atmosphere you can feel, see, touch and smell; listening with others in a shared environment makes for a communal experience.
